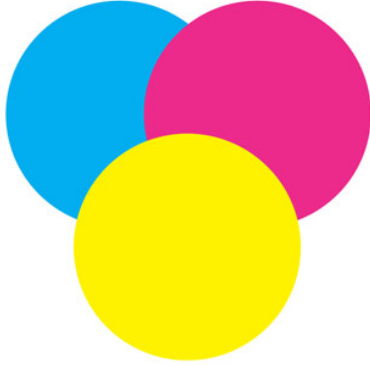


# Overprint Preview

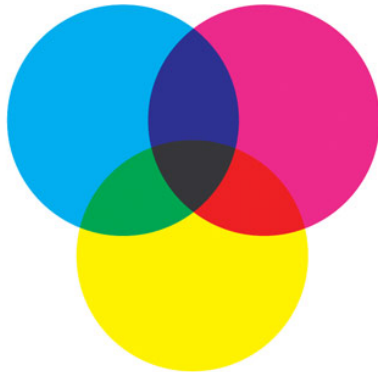

Overprinting happens when a file is designed using two or more colors to create a third color instead of knocking out the bottom layers - or a logo is put on top of a image. In order to view the print output of this effect on-screen, overprint preview has to be turned on. If the file has any spot colors and/or transparency blending effects, it is very important that overprint preview is turned on to accurately view any mixing of transparencies with spot colors. We recommend that your settings always default to overprint preview on.

To check and update your settings, follow the steps below:

Acrobat Reader or Standard:  
Go to Edit > Preferences  
Select Page Display.  
Under "Page Content and Information", the "Use Overprint Preview" dropdown menu, confirm or change to be set to Always.

To see the difference between the views, toggle between checked and unchecked.
